
IMPORTANT: PLEASE READ THESE INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY. NOTE THE SAFE OPERATIONAL REQUIREMENTS, WARNINGS & CAUTIONS. USE THE PRODUCT CORRECTLY AND WITH CARE FOR THE PURPOSE FOR WHICH IT IS INTENDED. FAILURE TO DO SO MAY CAUSE DAMAGE OR PERSONAL INJURY AND WILL INVALIDATE THE WARRANTY. PLEASE KEEP INSTRUCTIONS SAFE FOR FUTURE USE.

1. SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS

1.1. ELECTRICAL SAFETY. WARNING! It is the user's responsibility to read, understand and comply with the following:

You must check all electrical equipment and appliances to ensure they are safe before using. You must inspect power supply leads, plugs and all electrical connections for wear or damage. You must ensure the risk of electric shock is minimised by the installation of appropriate safety devices. An RCCB (Residual Current Circuit Breaker) should be incorporated in the main distribution board. We also recommend that an RCD (Residual Current Device) is used with all electrical products. It is particularly important to use an RCD with portable products that are plugged into an electrical supply not protected by an RCCB. If in doubt consult a qualified electrician. You may obtain a Residual Current Device by contacting your Sealey dealer. **You must** also read and understand the following instructions concerning electrical safety.

- 1.1.1. The **Electricity At Work Act 1989** requires all portable electrical appliances, if used on business premises, to be tested by a qualified electrician, using a Portable Appliance Tester (PAT), at least once a year.
- 1.1.2. The **Health & Safety at Work Act 1974** makes owners of electrical appliances responsible for the safe condition of those appliances, and the safety of appliance operators. **If in any doubt about electrical safety, contact a qualified electrician.**
- 1.1.3. Ensure the insulation on all cables and the product itself is safe before connecting to the mains power supply.
See 1.1.1. & 1.1.2. above and use a Portable Appliance Tester (PAT).
- 1.1.4. Ensure that cables are always protected against short circuit and overload.
- 1.1.5. Regularly inspect power supply leads and plugs for wear or damage and connections to ensure that none is loose.
- 1.1.6. **Important:** Ensure the voltage marked on the product is the same as the electrical power supply to be used, and check that plugs are fitted with the correct capacity fuse. A 13 amp plug may require a fuse smaller than 13 amps for certain products - see fuse rating at right.
- 1.1.7. DO NOT pull or carry the powered appliance by its power supply lead.
- 1.1.8. DO NOT pull power plugs from sockets by the power cable.
- 1.1.9. DO NOT use worn or damaged leads, plugs or connections. Immediately replace or have repaired by a qualified electrician. Where a U.K. 3 pin plug with ASTA/BS approval is fitted, in case of damage, cut off and fit a new plug according to the following instructions (discard old plug safely).
(UK only - see diagram at right). **Ensure the unit is correctly earthed via a three-pin plug.**

- a) **Connect the GREEN/YELLOW earth wire to the earth terminal 'E'.**
- b) **Connect the BROWN live wire to the live terminal 'L'.**
- c) **Connect the BLUE neutral wire to the neutral terminal 'N'.**
- d) **After wiring, check there are no bare wires, that all wires have been correctly connected, that the cable outer insulation extends past the cable restraint and that the cable restraint is tight.**

Double insulated products are often fitted with live (BROWN) and neutral (BLUE) wires only. Double insulated products are always marked with this symbol . **To re-wire, connect the brown & blue wires as indicated above. DO NOT connect the brown or blue wires to the earth terminal.**

- 1.1.10. **NOTE:** If this product requires more than a 13 amp electrical supply, then **NO** plug is fitted. **You must** therefore contact a qualified electrician to ensure a 30 amp fused supply is available. We recommend you discuss the installation of an industrial round pin plug and socket with your electrician.
- 1.1.11. **Cable extension reels.** When a cable extension reel is used it should be fully unwound before connection. A cable reel with an RCD fitted is recommended since any product which is plugged into the cable reel will be protected. The section of the cores in the cable is important and should be at least 1.5mm², but to be absolutely sure that the capacity of the cable reel is suitable for this product and for others that may be used in the other output sockets, the use of 2.5mm² section is recommended.

1.2 GENERAL SAFETY

- ✓ Familiarise yourself with the application and limitations of the saw, as well as the specific potential hazards.
- WARNING! Ensure all Health and Safety, local authority, and general workshop practice regulations are strictly adhered to.**
- WARNING! Keep all guards and holding screws in place, tight and in good working order. Check regularly for damaged parts.** A guard, or any other part, that is damaged must be repaired or replaced before next use of the saw. The safety guards are mandatory when the bandsaw is used in premises covered by the Health & Safety at Work Act.
- WARNING! Disconnect bandsaw from the mains power supply before changing accessories, making repairs or adjustments.**
- WARNING! Wear approved safety eye protection, ear defenders, gloves and, if dust is generated, respiratory protection.**
- WARNING! Evaluate your working area before using the bandsaw and always give your work your undivided attention.**
- WARNING! Replace warning labels if they become obscured or removed.**
- WARNING! Always provide adequate support for long and heavy material.**
- WARNING! Never operate the bandsaw unless all blade guards are installed and in proper working order.**
- WARNING! Never operate the bandsaw with the blade in the raised position.**
- WARNING! Do not turn bandsaw on until workpiece is secured in vice and the blade has been positioned just above the workpiece.**
- WARNING! Do not over tighten blade as it will stretch and warp.**
- WARNING! Take care lifting the bandsaw arm as it is heavy, and could, if not correctly lifted, affect the whole balance of the machine.**
- ✓ Locate the bandsaw in a suitable area, keep area clean and uncluttered and ensure there is adequate lighting.
- ✓ Maintain the machine and keep in good condition (use an authorised service agent).
- ✓ Ensure the machine is situated on a solid surface, adequate for supporting the weight of the machine and the workpiece.
- ✓ Check the alignment of moving parts regularly, for safest performance keep the machine clean at all times.
- ✓ Turn off the machine before raising the blade.

- ✓ Avoid unintentional starting.
- ✓ Regularly remove, clean and inspect the blade brush.
- ✓ Remove any adjusting keys and wrenches from the bandsaw before turning it on.
- ✓ Replace or repair damaged parts. Use recommended parts only. Non-authorized parts may be dangerous and will invalidate the warranty.
- ✓ Keep hands and body clear of the work table when operating the bandsaw.
- ✓ Maintain correct balance and footing, ensure the floor is not slippery and wear non-slip rubber soled footwear.
- ✓ Remove ill fitting clothing, ties and loose jewellery, and tie back long hair.
- ✓ Ensure there are no flammable or combustible materials near the work area.
- x DO NOT leave the machine running unattended.
- x DO NOT operate the machine if any parts are damaged or missing as this may cause failure and/or personal injury.
- x DO NOT use the bandsaw for a task it is not designed to perform.
- x DO NOT use bandsaw near to flammable liquids, solids or gases, such as paint solvents and including waste wiping or cleaning rags.
- x DO NOT use damaged or deformed bandsaw blades.
- x DO NOT remove the safety guard whilst in use.
- x DO NOT hold the workpiece by hand.
- x DO NOT touch the workpiece immediately after cutting, it may be very hot.
- x DO NOT operate the machine when you are tired, under the influence of alcohol, drugs or intoxicating medication.
- x DO NOT allow children or untrained persons to operate the machine. Keep them away from the work area.
- ✓ When not in use unplug from the mains supply and make every effort to make the machine childproof.

2. INTRODUCTION & SPECIFICATION

The SM35CE is designed for light/medium metal cutting work in engineering workshops, garages and metal fabricators, etc., **in a horizontal position only**. It is not to be used for cutting any other material, or used in a vertical position. The bandsaw is not suitable for cutting wood and, if used for this purpose, the insurer will not provide coverage.

The saw arm is fitted with hydraulic damping to prevent it being dropped onto the workpiece and to ensure smooth cutting performance and the blade guards are redesigned for improved safety. The heavy duty single phase electric motor has an over-current sensor to cut the power in the event of blade jamming.

The saw is manufactured to comply with Supply of Machinery (Safety) Regulations 1992 (S.I.3073) and is fully CE approved.





3. ASSEMBLY

3.1. Unpacking

- 3.1.1. Unpack the bandsaw and inspect all parts. If any parts are damaged **contact your distributor**.
- 3.1.2. Unbolt from the transport skid and place on a firm, level surface.
- 3.1.3. Clean all rust protected surfaces with kerosene, diesel oil, or a mild solvent. Do not use cellulose based solvents as these will damage painted surfaces.

3.2. Assembly

- 3.2.1. Place blocks under each end of the saw base to allow for wheel installation. **Caution: Make sure the saw is completely supported.**
- 3.2.2. Insert both wheel axles through the holes in the base.
- 3.2.3. Attach wheels onto both axles and fasten with washers and split pins provided.
- 3.2.4. Insert the stop rod (fig.1.A) into the cutting base and tighten screw (B).
- 3.2.5. Locate the material stop (C) onto stop rod and secure it by tightening the thumb screw (D).
- 3.2.6. Attach the pulley cover (fig.2.1) with the screws and washers provided. Close when attached and secure with thumb screw (fig.2.2).
- 3.2.7. Remove the transportation strap and save for later use should the saw need to be moved - see label on bottom left of blade arm. Adjust arm stop so that toothed edge of blade is just below level of table. Adjust cut-off switch actuation screw, to the right of arm stop, so that motor is cut-off at this point but switch is not supporting weight of blade arm.



3.3. Coolant Tank Preparation

NOTE: Use a water-soluble lubricant to increase cutting efficiency and prolong blade life. **Do not use other types of cutting oil.**

- 3.3.1. Remove coolant return hose from the tank cover, pull tank out of saw base and carefully remove lid containing the coolant pump.
- 3.3.2. Fill tank to approximately 80% capacity.
- 3.3.3. Replace lid and return the tank assembly to the base. Replace coolant return hose into the tank cover.


4. OPERATING INSTRUCTIONS

WARNING! Before operating the bandsaw ensure that you read, understand and apply the safety instructions in Section 1.

4.1. Operation

NOTE: Before operating the machine certain checks and adjustments will need to be carried out. It is very important that these instructions are followed carefully in order that the machine is set up safely and correctly.

- 4.1.1. Check that the blade is suitable for the material to be cut (see Section 2 for blade selection and paras. 5.1. and 5.10. for blade changing).
- 4.1.2. Check the blade for correct tension (see para. 5.3) and check the blade guide bearings (see para. 5.8).
- 4.1.3. Select the appropriate speed for the material being cut (see Section 2).
- 4.1.4. Raise the blade arm and lock in position by closing hydraulic valve (fig.3.A)
- 4.1.5. Secure the material to be cut in the vice.
- 4.1.6. Open hydraulic valve, lower blade arm until blade is just above workpiece, close valve and then position both blade guides as close to the work as possible.
- 4.1.7. Check the coolant level.
- 4.1.8. Plug in the saw, turn on isolating switch, switch on the coolant pump and then the saw (all switches in switch box on saw arm). **DO NOT** start saw with blade touching workpiece.
- 4.1.9. Open hydraulic valve (fig.3.A) to allow blade to come down onto workpiece. Adjust feed rate as required with control knob (fig.3.B) (see para. 5.4). Coolant flow may be adjusted by control valve above left hand blade guide.



5. ADJUSTMENTS

WARNING! Before following any of the steps below ensure the bandsaw is switched off, isolated from the mains power supply and at a complete standstill. Failure to comply with this instruction can result in serious injury.

5.1. Blade and speed selection

- 5.1.1. Refer to Section 2 for the recommended setup for cutting various materials.
- 5.1.2. A good rule for blade selection is that three teeth should always be in contact with the workpiece, therefore, **the thinner the work piece, the more teeth the blade should have.**


5.2. To adjust blade speed

- 5.2.1. Open belt cover and loosen the motor plate lock bolt (fig.2.A).
- 5.2.2. Loosen the motor plate slide bolts (fig.2.B) until the belt can be moved on the pulleys.
- 5.2.3. Move the belt to the desired pulley locations.
- 5.2.4. Tighten motor plate slide bolts until belt is tensioned (approx. 10mm deflection under thumb pressure), tighten lock bolt and close belt cover.

5.3. To adjust blade tension

NOTE: Proper blade tension is very important to the safe and efficient running of the bandsaw. The correct tension for the SM35CE is between **700 to 900 kg** as measured with a blade tension gauge.

- 5.3.1. Install the blade around the wheels and between the blade bearing guides.
- 5.3.2. Turn the blade tension knob (fig.4.A) clockwise sufficiently to remove any sag and then a further one or two revolutions. **Do not overtighten.**
- 5.3.3. Close the blade cover, reconnect the saw to the power source and run for two to three minutes to seat the blade.
- 5.3.4. Disconnect the saw from the power source, open the blade cover and loosen the tension until the blade just begins to sag.
- 5.3.5. Tighten the blade until it is straight between the blade wheels and all sag has been eliminated. Turn the blade tension knob a further two revolutions to give correct tension. Close the blade cover.




5.4. Hydraulic feed adjustment

- 5.4.1. Adjust the hydraulic feed by turning the knob (fig.3.B) situated on the hydraulic cylinder. Anti-clockwise will increase the feed rate, clockwise will decrease it.
- 5.4.2. To stop the flow of hydraulic fluid, turn off the hydraulic valve (fig.3.A).

5.5. To adjust blade square to table

- 5.5.1. Place a machinist's square on the table next to the blade, see fig.5.A.
- 5.5.2. Check to see if the blade makes contact with the square across the entire width of the blade.
- 5.5.3. If adjustment is necessary, loosen the blade guide assembly cap screws (fig.6.B) and rotate both guides slightly in the same direction until the blade makes contact with the square across its entire width. Tighten the cap screws.



5.6. To adjust vice square to blade


- 5.6.1. Place a machinist's square flat on table with one edge along face of vice and the other edge along cutting section of blade, see fig.5.B.
- 5.6.2. Check to see if the blade is parallel with the square.
- 5.6.3. If adjustment is necessary, loosen bolts (fig.7.A) holding the vice and adjust. Retighten bolts.

5.7. To adjust the blade guides

- 5.7.1. Loosen the adjusting knob (fig.6.A) on each blade guide and slide guide assemblies as close as possible to each side of the workpiece.

5.8. To adjust the blade guide bearings

- 5.8.1. Raise the saw arm to a vertical position and close the hydraulic valve (fig.3.B).



- 5.8.2. Loosen the hex. cap screw (fig.6.B) on the guide assembly and adjust the rear bearing to within 0.08 - 0.12 mm of the blade.
- 5.8.3. Loosen lock nut (fig.6.C) and turn the front bearing eccentric (fig.6.D) so that bearing is snug with the blade. The blade should still move up and down freely if grasped. Repeat the procedure for the other guide assembly.

5.9. Adjusting the vice

NOTE: Do not adjust the vice or load/unload any material while the saw is running. The vice can be adjusted to hold the workpiece at angles between 0° and 45°.

- 5.9.1. Slacken the bolts (fig.7.A) clamping the fixed vice.
- 5.9.2. Position the vice at the desired angle and tighten bolts.
- 5.9.3. Loosen the bolts (fig.7.B) on the moveable vice and turn it to match the angle of the fixed vice. Tighten bolts when vice faces are parallel.



WARNING! Before following any of the steps below ensure the bandsaw is switched off, isolated from the mains power supply and at a complete standstill. Failure to comply with this instruction can cause serious injury.

5.10. Changing blades

NOTE: In order to assist with the removal of the blade it is recommended that the two blade guide assemblies are first removed. The coolant supply piping can be removed without being disconnected. Carefully place the assembly to one side, in a position where there is no possibility of it falling and sustaining any damage.

- 5.10.1. Remove the yellow blade guard and the brush.
- 5.10.2. Raise the saw arm to a vertical position and lock in place by turning off the hydraulic cylinder at valve (fig.3.A).
- 5.10.3. Open the blade cover (located on the back of the arm) by removing the two screws.
- 5.10.4. Loosen blade tension by turning blade tension knob (fig.4.A) anti-clockwise and carefully remove the blade.
Caution: Blade teeth are sharp, handle with care.
- 5.10.5. Place new blade between guide bearings (if not removed) and then around both wheels, ensuring blade edge rests near each wheel flange.
NOTE: The teeth must be pointing in the correct direction (indicated on the label found on the saw arm).
- 5.10.6. Tension blade (see para. 5.3.4 & 5). **Do not over tension.**
- 5.10.7. Close the blade cover and secure with the screws.
- 5.10.8. Replace blade guides, if removed, and re-attach the blade guard and blade brush.
- 5.10.9. Adjust the blade guides as described in para. 5.8.

5.11. Adjusting bow weight

NOTE: Incorrect bow weight can cause crooked cuts, tooth stripping, stalling and the blade to ride off the wheels. The hydraulic feed rate unit will not compensate for improper bow weight and if adjustment is necessary proceed as follows:

- 5.11.1. Turn the hydraulic cylinder valve on and place the saw arm in the horizontal position.
- 5.11.2. Turn the feed rate valve (fig.3.B) on the hydraulic cylinder fully anti-clockwise.
- 5.11.3. Place the hook of a spring balance around the blade tension handle spindle and pull the saw arm up. The spring balance should indicate 5-6 kg.
- 5.11.4. If necessary, adjust the tension to 5-6 kg by turning the nuts (fig.8.A) on the spring adjusting rod. When adjustment is complete tighten both nuts to lock rod in position.



5.12. To adjust blade tracking

NOTE: Blade tracking is factory set and should not require adjustment. However, if it does become necessary, proceed as follows:

- 5.12.1. Run saw for a short time and then switch off.
- 5.12.2. Raise saw arm, open blade cover and check blade-to-wheel relationship (tracking). Rear edge of blade should be very close to, but not hard against, the wheel flanges.
- 5.12.3. If inspection indicates that adjustment is required loosen the two locking screws (fig.4.B) and adjust set screw (fig.4.C) - turn clockwise to track blade closer to flange and anticlockwise to track away. Retighten screws.
- 5.12.4. Having made a small adjustment **close the blade cover** and run the saw for a short time.
- 5.12.5. Switch saw off, open blade cover and check tracking. Repeat adjustment procedure if necessary.

6. MAINTENANCE

WARNING! Before carrying out any maintenance ensure that the bandsaw is switched off, isolated from the mains supply and that the blade is at a complete standstill. Failure to comply with this instruction can cause serious injury.

6.1. Lubrication

- 6.1.1. Ball bearings on the blade guide assemblies and blade wheels are permanently sealed requiring no lubrication.
- 6.1.2. Keep all surfaces clean and free of rust, swarf and coolant build-up.
- 6.1.3. Lightly lubricate vice screw with grease.

6.2. Changing gearbox oil

- 6.2.1. Change gearbox oil after the first 90 days of operation and thereafter every six months.
- 6.2.2. Place the saw arm in the horizontal position.
- 6.2.3. Remove screws from gearbox cover, to left of motor, and remove the cover plate and gasket.
- 6.2.4. Hold a container under the lower right corner of the gearbox, while slowly raising the saw arm.
- 6.2.5. When the oil flow stops, return the saw arm to a horizontal position and wipe out any remaining oil with a rag.
- 6.2.6. Fill the gearbox with approximately 300ml of 90 weight gear oil.
- 6.2.7. Replace the cover plate and gasket, and fasten securely with the screws.

6.3. General maintenance

- WARNING! Do not use compressed air to clean the bandsaw as metal filings may blow into the blade guide bearings and other critical areas. There is also a danger of flying particles being released into the surrounding area.**
- 6.3.1. Use a small paint brush or parts cleaning brush to remove metal particles. If inaccessible (and ferrous) use a magnetic pick-up tool.
- 6.3.2. Regularly wipe the saw down with a clean dry cloth and oil all unpainted surfaces with light machine oil.
- 6.3.3. Keep blade guides clean and free of metal filings.
- 6.3.4. Check the guide bearings frequently to make sure they are properly adjusted and turning freely.

6.4. Blade cleaning brush

- 6.4.1. Replace the brush as soon as it becomes worn or damaged or blade life will be significantly shortened.

7. TROUBLESHOOTING
